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Accomplishments 2022-2023

As we moved into the third year of COVID, unfortunately many staff caught the virus for the first time. Through it all we did our best to continue to balance the needs of staff and our clients. One new initiative was a trial of the COVID, Cough and Flu Care Clinics that were planned with partners across Elgin in St. Thomas and Aylmer. This showed how we can work better together across the County to coordinate the delivery of care and services.

Despite the stops and starts of COVID, we managed to successfully develop our new Strategic Plan. This included a new Mission, Vision, and Values along with updated strategic directions:

We continue to be challenged to obtain a permanent increase to our core funding from our funder that will benefit staff and our clients. We did manage to obtain some additional funding during the year:

- One-time \$168,000 mental health Roadmap to • Wellness for food insecurity, staff training and facility upgrades
- Permanent \$71,000 for Personal Support • Workers \$3/hour increase
- One-time \$70,000 Information Technology for • cabling, server, wi-fi network and laptops
- One-time \$67,000 provincial Temporary • **Retention Incentive for Nurses Program**
- Permanent \$25,000 2% base funding increase • for Assisted Living and Community Support Services

Some other highlights during the year included:

- New programs on Community Action Training, Best Weight, Insomnia, Men's Coffee, Youth Art Mindfulness, Movie Night, Virtual Bingo, Virtual Travel and Zumbini
- Selection and deployment of AlayaCare software for Assisted Living and Community Support Services
- Launching a winter emergency shelter at E. M. Warwick Conservation Area
- Serving as an official voting location and • supporting the community Hockeyville team

M-SAA Indicator Tracking 2022-23

The Health Centre signs a multi-year Multi-Sectoral Accountability Agreement (M-SAA) with our main funder Ontario Health West (formerly South West Local Health Integration Network).

For each year in the agreement the targets and corridors are set for the indicators. New indicators may be added and old ones dropped. The results are reported to the funder of Q2 (April 1 - September 30), Q3 (December 31) and Q4 (March 31) each year.

As shown below green results are meeting the target, yellow are within the acceptable corridor while red are not meeting the expected results. The Health Centre uses this information to show the areas that require review, are reflective of staff vacancies or areas that may need more attention.




