Accomplishments 2023-2024

This year was one of endings and beginnings. We saw many long-time staff retire including Dr. Kevin Mardell, Kate Dymock, Margaret Intven, Tobi Maniacco and Yvonne Rastin. We are grateful for the great care, services, and leadership they provided over their many years here. They will be missed! We also said goodbye to many other long-serving staff who moved on to the next phase on their work and life journey. All these amazing people cannot be replaced but so far we have been very lucky in being able to recruit many great new people to our Health Centre team.

This also marked the first year of our new Strategic Plan and we tried different things to meet the changing needs of our communities and clients. The Centre updated our Bylaws and Letters Patent (Articles of Amendment) at our first in-person Annual General Meeting since 2019. In the fall we also undertook our first Client Satisfaction survey since 2017 to hear the community's voice. The Centre also saw the development of the Peer Advocacy Action Committee which eventually merged with the Client and Family Advisory Council.

The year was a challenging one as our hardworking staff have not received pay increases for years. In December, the Community Health Compensation Report was released showing how underpaid our staff are for the great work that they do everyday. This has been further complicated by the lack of increases to operational funding for many years.

One of the areas the Board took a leadership role on was in fundraising. A small group has started up to help many of the Centre's programs get additional funding they need to keep up with cost of inflation. This year was the first time that the Centre reported a deficit during the year. Unfortunately, the lack of funding increases has impacted on the number of people able to use our services. Expect to hear more from this fundraising group going forward. As we continue to pursue permanent increases to our core funding that will benefit our staff and our clients, we did obtain some additional resources during the year:

- Permanent \$536,723 to be split with Oxford County CHC for new First Five program for those aged 0-5 years who do not currently have access to a Doctor or Nurse Practitioner.
- One-time \$130,000 Ontario Trillium Grant for Teaching Kitchen renovations.
- One-time \$88,900 for Community Health Centre staff and operating expenses.
- Permanent \$45,248 for Assisted Living and Community Support Services staff and operating expenses.
- One-time \$41,021 Community Infrastructure Renewal Funds for basement leak repair and generator fuel tank.
- Permanent \$26,741 for physician salaries and benefits.
- One-time \$17,950 for Community Support Services equipment and supplies.
- One-time \$4,750 from Elgin County Warden Tournament for system navigation.

Some other highlights during the year included:

- Launch of Parent and Baby Gathering, and Youth Social Prescribing programs.
- Replacement of West Lorne Community Garden beds.
- Partnering with Second Harvest Food Rescue to redistribute surplus food from a local grocery store.
- Unfortunately, like many of our neighbours, the Centre had a flooding event in July with two feet of water in the basement. Extensive remediation and cleanup was undertaken to recover from this event.

Thanks again to all our amazing staff, volunteers and community partners for your spirit over the past year. We cannot do this great work without you. We hope to see you at our 30th anniversary celebration on July 10, 2024!

M-SAA Indicator Tracking 2023-24

The Health Centre signs a multi-year Multi-Sectoral Accountability Agreement (M-SAA) with our main funder Ontario Health West (formerly South West Local Health Integration Network).

For each year in the agreement the targets and corridors are set for the indicators. New indicators may be added and old ones dropped. The results are reported to the funder of Q2 (April 1 - September 30), Q3 (December 31) and Q4 (March 31) each year.

As shown below green results are meeting the target, yellow are within the acceptable corridor while red are not meeting the expected results. The Health Centre uses this information to show the areas that require review, are reflective of staff vacancies or areas that may need more attention.

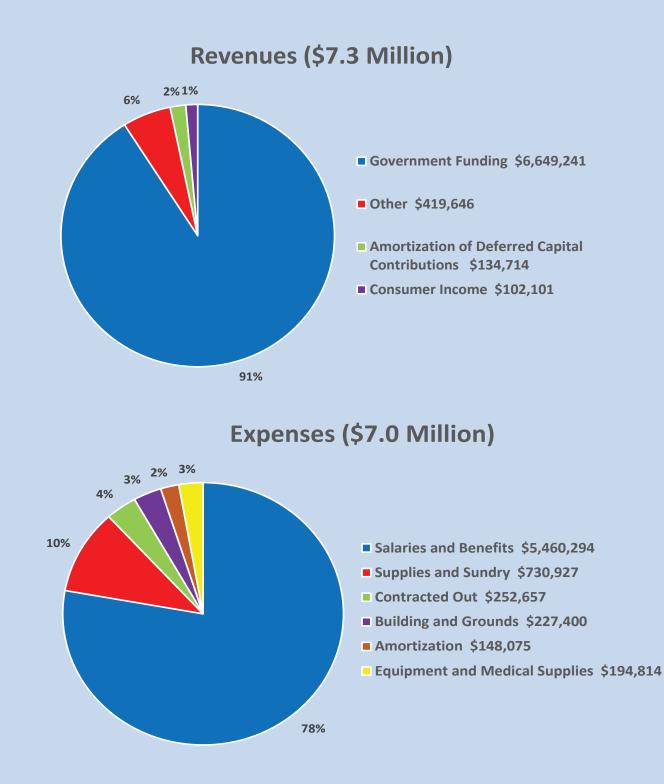
